

# **Burmese Democratic Futures Working Group – BDFWG**

### **Weekly Summary (June 15- 21, 2024)**

#### **Conflicts and Casualties:**

- Attacks by NUG-affiliated PDFs in various regions of Myanmar resulted in the deaths of 357 members of the Military Council and 10 members of the Joint People's Defense Forces.
- The Aungthawara military council camp in Taninthary Township in Taninthary Region , established for almost three decades, was seized by the 4th Brigade of the Karen National Liberation Army (KNLA).
- The Chin Brotherhood Forces and their allies captured the 304th Army Battalion of the Military Council in Matupi, in Chin State
- The Military Council army regained control of the Kennedy Mountain camp in Northern Chin State, previously held by PDF Zoland with a force exceeding 100. In Chin State,

- Ongoing conflicts between the Military Council and revolutionary forces persist in Hsihseng city and its surrounding areas in southern Shan State.
- The joint forces led by the Karen National Liberation Army (KNLA) Brigade (6) successfully captured the Sukkalisha military council camp in Karen State, situated south of Myawaddy.

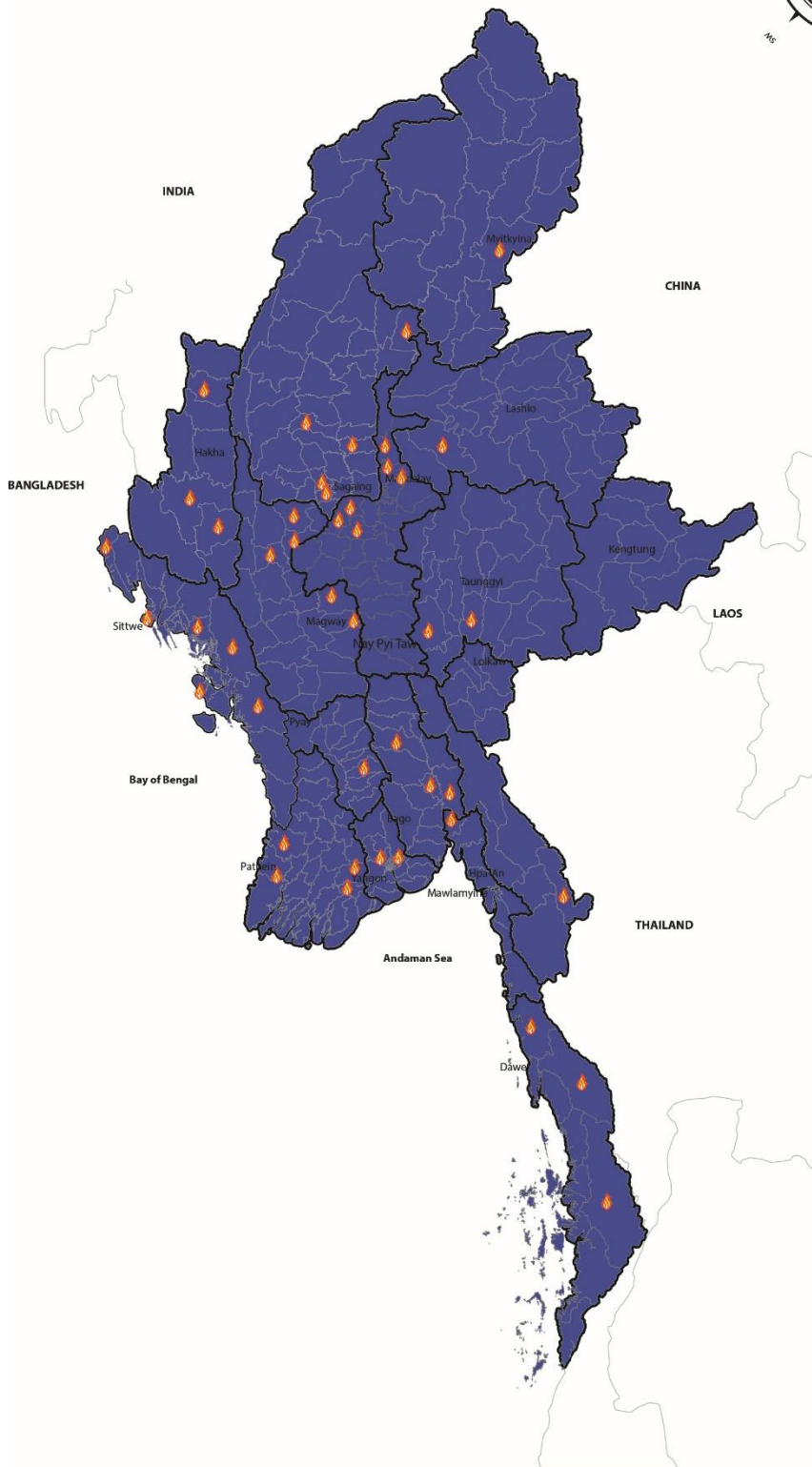
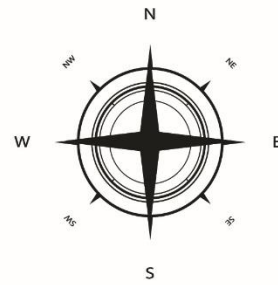
#### **Civilian Casualties/Death/Losses:**

- In various areas of Myanmar, the Terrorist Military Council's use of aerial and heavy weaponry resulted in the deaths of 17 civilians, including 2 monks, 3 children, and 2 women.
- Additionally, 105 houses were set on fire and destroyed by the Military Council in different parts of Myanmar.
- Furthermore, 246 innocent civilian were arrested by the Military Council, including 17 people who are found with VPN on their phones and 11 women who wore flowers on the 79th birthday of Aung San Suu Kyi.
